## MIRFIELD REGATTA.

On Saturday afternoon last, the fifth annual regatta took place on the River Calder at Mirfield, in the presence of at least 20,000 people. Visiters througed the liver side, filled the grand stand and scores of barges, occupied the bridge, and took coign of vantage on sundry elevated spots. The railway companies ran special trains from Huddersfield, Halifax, Bradford, Brighouse, &c., and sundry omnibus proprietors reaped a good harvest by carrying passengers from Dewsbury and other places in the neighbourhood. The day was beautifully fine, and all the People seemed to enjoy themselves most heartly. Not a single accident, that we have heard of, marred their pleasure.

The first race was one for four-pared boats, 23 feet length over all, lora first prize of £5 and a second of £2. There were four entries, and it to use a phrase current in sporting circles, came to the scratch at the sound of the starter's bell shortly after one o'clook. A fair start has made. The boat "Rocky Road" soon took the lead, and, maining it to the end, won the first prize; "Witch" being a good found; and "Lads About" third. Time, 12; minutes; distance, will yards.

The next event was a single-oared race, in which H. Ault, sen., in the lost, "Hollingworth," had it all his own way from beginning to od; Geo. Naylor, in "Lewis," bring a bad second. There were three-distributions, but they were "nowhere," Distance three-quarters of a nile.

A two-oared race in hoate 23 feet long, took place next, over the first course. There were four starters, but the race was virtually between they, viz.—"Witch," "Rocky Roud," and "Lads About," The clistuanical came in five lengths ahead of the second, but there was three quarters of a length between the latter and the third.

The great race of the day was one for four-oared boats, the prize being the Prince of Wales' stake £10, with prize of £5 for the second hear. It was run in heats, the distance being 2,430 yards out and hear. In the first, "The Rive Friends," "College Bawn," and Manchetter crew, wen easily, and many bets were laid that it would heat the "field." In the second heat, the "British Queen carried off the falm, but when the deciding race was pulled off the Munchester men easily.

There was also a sculling race, in which Fred Oates took the first bive, and John Bottomley the second. This was followed by a sainting race, in which about a dozen professors of the art of natation took part.
